Who Can Take College Courses at CCBC?

Starting July 1, 2016, any BCPS 9th, 10th, 11th, or 12th grade student can take courses at CCBC at a 50% rate of reduction in tuition. *This reduction is currently only available to 10th-12th grade students.*

Tuition Free Courses:

Juniors and Seniors who have an unweighted grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 or higher can take up to a total of four courses tuition free as long as the courses are taken during the fall and/or spring semesters.

Dual Credit Courses:

There are approximately 50 courses BCPS high school students can take at CCBC which enable them to earn both college credit and high school credit. They are worth the highest quality points available to BCPS students.

Please Note:

Students may not take courses at CCBC that are required for graduation from their BCPS high school during the spring semester of their senior year.

How Can You Take Advantage of These Opportunities?

1. Meet with your BCPS Professional School Counselor to discuss your interests and options.
2. Complete the CCBC Application for Admission & submit the Early College Access Consent form to the CCBC Admissions Office.
3. Meet with a CCBC Admission's Counselor to discuss assessment and placement testing. After testing, meet with a CCBC Academic Advisor to discuss your placement test results. Register for the class of your choice.
4. Bring a copy of your CCBC course registration to your BCPS Professional School Counselor prior to the CCBC add/drop deadline for the semester in which you are registered.

*** If you would like to take the CCBC course for Dual Credit, you must inform your School Counselor prior to the add/drop deadline for the semester in which you are registered to take the course and verify that the BCPS Dual Credit Course Name, which begins with "COLL," is on your high school schedule.

*** Once the Dual Credit Course that begins with "COLL" is on your high school schedule, the grade you earn in your CCBC course will go on your BCPS transcript and impact your high school GPA.
